

Pedigree of the Family of De Fynes.

A Pedigree illustrating the early ancestry of the House of De Fynes, and shewing the close kinship of three Kentish families who were prominent actors in Jack Cadé's Rebellion, viz. of De Fiennes, Cromer, and Iden, and how a descent from the latter, through two Kentish yeoman families, viz. of Plane and Henham, has perpetuated the name of Iden down to the present time.

House of De Saye.

William de Saye, companion of the Conqueror.
 Agnes de Grentesmaisnil, dau. of the celebrated Hugh.

Geoffrey de Saye, Hawise, dau. of De Clare.

William de Saye, Beatrice, dau. of W^m Mandeville, sister of Godfrey, Earl of Essex; ob. 1201.

House of De Fiennes.

John, Baron Fiennes, kinsman of the Conqueror; Hereditary Constable of Dover and Warden of the Cinque Ports. (See *Dicf. De la Noblesse*, par De la Chenaye-Desbois et Badier, Paris, 1866.)

Pharamus, de Boulogne, son of W^m, son of Galfred, Count of Boulogne; mentioned in a charter of King Stephen, whose Household he managed; called a nephew of Queen Maud, King Stephen's wife. (See the Duchess of Cleveland's *Battle Abbey Roll*, vol. ii., p. 19, and vol. i., p. 28.) Descended from Charlemayne.

Sybyl, called De Tyngrie, "Lady of Clapham, Surrey."—Sir Ingelram de Fiennes, slain at the Battle of Acon 1190. (See Dugdale, *Monast.*, vol. i., p. 583.)

Sir Will^m de Fiennes, P^a 200 marks for the manor of Wendover, Bucks, obtained the King's mandate to the Sheriff of Somerset to deliver to him the manor of Martock, Somerset, whereunto his mother Sybyl had quited her claim in open court, which manor was formerly part of the Honour of Eustace, sometime Earl of Boulogne, and which W^m of Boulogne (son of King Stephen) gave to Pharamus in fee. c | Sir James Fynes, created Lord Saye and Sele 1446; Lord High Treasurer of England, Emmeline de Walsingham. By Dugdale stated as residing principally at Knole Park, Sevenoaks. He was beheaded by Jack Cade, the Emmeline Cromer of Willingham. (See E. Rowe Rebel. His will, 28 Hen. VI., Knole Park and other estates were sold by his son to More's *Hist. of Tunstall*; *Biblio. Topog. Britan.*, Thomas Bouchier, Archbishop of Canterbury. vol. i., art. i.)

William Cromer, Sheriff of Kent Elizabeth Fynes. (See E. R. More's Alexander Iden of Westwell, Kent, Sheriff 1450 and 1456, son of 1450, son of Sir William Cromer, *Hist. of Tunstall* and Hasted's *Kent*, John Iden of Westwell, who acquired Cheney's Court from the twice Lord Mayor of London; of vol. iii., p. 205.) Her brother Sir Wm. Cheney family (Hasted). He received an annuity, and was made Borsstall Manor, Minster, Isle of Fynes sold the Hereditary Constable- Keeper of Rochester Castle, "for his services upon the Sea, and Sheppey; beheaded by Cade with ship of Dover to the Duke of Buckingham especially for the capture of Jack Cade, the Rebel," at Heathfield, Sussex; bur. in y^e Cromer Chapel of St. Martin's Orgar, Cannon Street. Will proved P.C.C., 1457, appointing his wife and Stephen Norton of Sutton, his ex'ors. (See *Sussex Arch. Transact.*, vol. 18, and *Genealogical Records of Families of King and Henham*, by W. L. King, 1899.)

Thomas Iden of Malmains in Stoke, Sheriff of Kent 1500. His will, 1513, wherein he appoints Sir William Cromer, Knt., overseer, and Sir Edward Poynings, Knt., Edward Guilford, Esquire, and John Butler, gent., his ex'ors. Also Inq. p.m. for ownership of Cheney's Court, etc.; and for parentage see Grant of Arms to Thomas Brown 1626.

Alexander Iden, Jasper Iden of Yalding Manor (Herald's Visitation 1574); mentioned in father's will. By Agnes, dau. of . . . eldest son. (See his first wife he had a dau. Ciceley, who married Thomas Brown. (See Grant of Arms to Fysenden. 2nd wife. Inq. p.m. of Tho- his descendant Thomas Brown 1626, giving marginal descent of Iden, in which grant Ciceley (Herald's Visitation, mas Iden 1513.) is called an heir-general of her family.) Jasper's will proved Rochester Court 1560. (Herald's Visitation, 1574.)

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William Iden of Sutton, and afterwards of West Farleigh Court and manor. By his will, proved P.C.C. 1561, he devised Cheney's Court, etc., to John, son of Jasper Iden. (See Inq. p.m. of Thomas Iden of Stoke, 1513.)

Robert Iden, Herald's Visitation, 1574. (See Chancery Bills—Iden v. Neville, wherein he and his brother John claimed the manor of Yalding, 1576.) A curious report, Lord Abergavennie saying "he would sooner see the Idens' throats cut than entertain them into his service." This nobleman was committed to ward for striking the Earl of Oxford in the Royal presence.

John Iden of Hadlow, "Esquire." Will, P.C.C. 1612. He devised Cheney's Court to his sister Kenward, and failing issue, to his sisters Barton and Plane; mentions his uncle Fyenden of Brenchley. He was the last of his family, who anciently were of "The Mote," in Iden, Sussex, and living there in 1280. (See Collin's *Peerage*, vol. ix, p. 2.)

Joane, mar. . . . Barton of Hadlow (John's will).

A dau., mar. . . . Kenward of Sutton (John's will).

Plane, or Playne, Kent.

Wyat Plane, or Playne, of Hadlow; owned lands in Hadlow and East Peckham; of kin to Thomas Plane—Rebecca Iden, mar. 1st one Jones of Tonbridge, whose two daughters mar. . . . Petley and . . . Nevinson (see Berry's *Kent Families*). Will and 2ndly, 1570, to Wyat Plane of proved in Rochester Court 1597; mentioned in John Iden's will as his "loving Brother." Half a dozen deeds of his were amongst the Twysden Muniments in the Larking Sale at Sotheby's April 7, 1892.

Rebecca Iden, mar. 1st one Jones of Tonbridge, whose two daughters mar. . . . Petley and . . . Nevinson (see Berry's *Kent Families*). Will and 2ndly, 1570, to Wyat Plane of Hadlow (Hadlow Register); mentioned in brother John's will, 1612.

Henry Plane, bapt. at Hadlow 1572. Will, Rochester Court, 1620. Bur. at East Peckham. He was ex'or to John Iden of Hadlow.

Thomas Plane, bapt. at Hadlow 1574. Will, Shoreham Peculiars, 1634; mentions son Iden Plane, and "loving Brother George Children of Tonbridge." Bur. at East Peckham.

Margaret, dau. of . . . Children of Tonbridge; mar. at Tonbridge 1605. Her family were of "Childrens," in Hildenborough, and Ramhurst, in *Lytton*; also of Bore Place, Sevenoaks. (See will of George Children of Sevenoaks, P.C.C. 1595; also Add. MS. 5520.) A descendant was Sheriff of Kent 1698.

Iden Plane of East Peckham, bapt. at Hadlow 1610; mentioned in the will of John Iden of Hadlow as his godson, and a legatee; also in brother Michael Plane's will, Rochester Court, 1667.

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Esingham, Engham, Henham, and Henham, Kent.

Mary Plaine, Richard Henham of East Peckham, Maltster (son of Gregory Henham of Great Chart, who died there 1653, leaving by his will, bapt. at East Peckham 1649; mar. at same place 1670; mentioned in uncle Michael's will 1667.

Esingham, Engham, Henham, and Henham, Kent.

P.C.C., a property called Fleading *alias* Flooding); bapt. at Great Chart 1648; bur. at East Peckham 1699. Will proved in Shoreham Peculiar 1700, mentions his eldest son Iden, also son Gregory, etc. This was a yeoman branch of the ancient house of Engham of Woodchurch, spelt in old deeds and charters Engham, Hengham, and Edingham. (See Cox's *Mag. Britan.*, p. 1130.) Mr. Lambert Larking, late Secretary of the Kent Archaeological Society, acquainted the family with this information, and his custody of the Twysden Muniments gave him unique sources of information, as the Twysdens formerly lived at Chelmington in Great Chart. Weaver remarks that four men of the name of Engham lived in successive generations at Great Chart for 329 years; they have been referred to, and known, as the "Old Gentlemen of Kent." It is noteworthy that another Great Chart family, formerly known as Engthurst, at a latter period wrote themselves Henhurst. (See also *Red Book of Exchequer*, published 1896, vol. ii., p. 581, wherein Ryngeham is indexed Henham. The name Hengham or Henham existed at an early period in East Anglia, of whom was the eminent Judge Ralf de Hengham (see Bloomfield's *Norfolk and Dugdale's Old St. Paul's*), and it is recorded that Vincent Engham of Goodneston, Kent, augmented his coat armour with a chief similar to the Judge's, as a memorial of his consanguinity.

Iden Henham, bapt. at East Peckham 1671; Mary, dau. of . . . Simmons; mar. at Yalding 1695. (Heralds' Coll., D. 18, fol. 102^a.)

Iden Henham, bapt. at East Peckham 1700; acquired the Parsonage House and Great Tythes of East Anne . . . By tradition believed Peckham, with lands in Yalding, Brecheley, and Watringbury, and was lord of the manor of Wold- to have been a dau. of . . . Iden Henham, bapt. at East Mary, dau. of William Larking of Duck's Peckham, and formerly of father's lifetime. Place, East Peckham, and formerly of P.C.C., Nov. 1790. Thomas Henham of East Peckham and Woldham, died unmar. Will, Shoreham Peculiar, 1789.

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Thomas Henham of the Parsonage, East Peckham, and Lay Rector; bapt. at Watring—Mary, dau. of William Woodhams of Bolebrook bury 1770; bur. in the vault at Peckham, with mural tablet above. Will, P.C.C., 1834. Court, Hartfield, Sussex; mar. there 1794 (see He and his family were extensive hop growers, giving their name to one variety of the *Kentish Register*, 1794); bur. in y.^c vault at Peckham 1865.

Iden Henham of Grove House, East Peckham; bapt. at—Mary, dau. of William Townsend of the Pavilion, Mereworth; Watringbury 1772; died before 1816. ob. 1842.

Iden Henham, Thomas Henham of Grove House, —Margaret Boorman, niece of Thomas Hugh Boorman of Brixton, Surrey, and East ob. s.p. born 1794; ob. 1854. Peckham, Kent. (See Grant of Arms to him.)

Iden Henham of Grove House, born 1829; removed about 1856 with his family to Melbourne, —Mary Ann, dau. of Thomas Lansdell Australia. All his sons being christened Iden, and living there 1906. of Lamberhurst, Sussex.

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
